Director's Report to the Sun Region

It's been an especially busy fall and winter for some of your Sun board members, and I'm excited to see so much progress in areas that will help us achieve our long range goals. We have a new website that is colorful, interesting, and becoming more user-friendly each day. Your marketing team is making progress with collecting survey information that will help us plan future budgets and focus on recruiting and retention efforts as well as designing and writing our Marketing Resource Guide. Keep reading to find details in Lynn and Liz's reports.

All officers and chairpersons now have generic addresses. I thank Lynn for setting up and maintaining the proper routing for these addresses. As individuals move in and out of offices and chairs, the e-mail address remains the same. If you already have these individuals in your e-mail directory, you have the option of using either the personal or generic address. Another advantage is that generic addresses can be used in public locations (web sites) and in our Sun news while protecting the privacy of the individual. This is your first issue of Sun News with the personal information removed. Our next step is to eliminate the password! We will discuss the pros and cons of this change at the March meeting.

I recently received a letter from the Seminar 2009 fundraising chair thanking us for our donations. Our basket (box) brought in \$227.00 and was won by Kris Kyles, the director of the Great Lakes region. The Elsa Williams "Merton" crewel kit, donated by Joyce Ann Stevens of DuClay chapter earned \$105.00 in the live auction. Again, thanks to Joyce Ann for her donation and to Pat Carrington and her committee for all their hard work and the individuals who donated so many wonderful items. Including funds for shipping was a very positive selling point.

What about 2010? We are going compact and spendable! Betty Baechle will do a "show and tell" at the March meeting. We hope each chapter has budgeted some funds to donate to our 2010 effort and will forward a check to Pam Burke as soon as possible. With your help, we can present a generous opportunity basket from our region.

About marketing: to some, the term marketing may sound a bit daunting or commercial. On the positive side, it involves organization and growth planning, promotion and membership building, to name just a few functions. This definition fits with where our region and chapters' focus should be. We are promoting EGA, our chapters and the benefits of being a member of this great organization. We want to recruit members and retain the ones we have, and we want to do this work without loosing sight of why we are EGA – to have great education programs, enjoy each other's company and produce beautiful embroidery – that some like to call art, others prefer to call it needlework. What we all agree on is that it is much more than a craft or hobby and it is our passion.

Your executive committee recently gave Cheri Hammer the go-ahead to simplify the procedures for our region sponsored GCC. Each chapter has the opportunity to participate. If you cannot reach the minimum of 10 students, please consider working with another chapter either on a chapter or individual level. We also hope all chapters are thinking about how they will take advantage of the Marketing Grant Program. This is your opportunity to receive financial assistance with your efforts to promote EGA and recruit new members.

I just returned from our EGA board meetings that took place March 4-7. My Louisville report appears on the next two pages. I know, it's pretty long and detailed, but we conducted a lot of business and my impression was that we accomplished a great deal. There's more information that I will communicate directly with specific departments such as Treasurers and membership chairs.

Director's Report From the March National EGA Board Meeting Jenna McClooney

Ladies, this is a long one, so please find a comfortable chair, read through the information and there will be an opportunity for questions during our meetings in Orlando. Note: I have expanded on the information in my newsletter article with information that you need to be aware of.

Clear, practical and measurable goals

• Your EGA board of directors is made up of the executive committee (President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Directors of Education, Bylaws & Marketing) plus 13 Region Directors. As a board, we collectively embrace three primary goals: (All with equal importance)

Provide outstanding customer service to members Live within our means – leading to a balanced budget Recruit new members, and retain current members.

- · Each executive committee member and region director has individual goals as well.
- With the elimination of the Executive Director's position, the board's primary role is to manage the affairs of the organization.
- Some words that represent good customer service include: "easy, fast, efficient, and gracious with service that results in satisfaction." Here's an example of our effort to provide better customer service at the headquarters' level: Staff will check e-mail throughout the working day and respond with the answer, or say that research is necessary and when to expect the answer, or say that the request has been sent to the appropriate individual and when to expect their response. You should know where you stand at any point in time
- Concerns about EGA customer service should be directed to me appropriate individual.

Website

- · We will be moving away from the current "static" format to a "content management" format.
- The costs for this format are considerably less to develop and maintain and specific EGA officers and specific chair persons will be able to update most content resulting in more accurate and timely information.
- Our new site will be a combination of our "public face" for the purposes of marketing and public education as well as an internal source of information that has controlled access and ease of use for all.

Procedure Change: Effective immediately, all EGA web change requests must be sent to me at rd@sunregionega.org. Information under Chapter Directory, List of EGA Chapters by region is occasionally incomplete and inaccurate and it is important that we routinely review the information at both the chapter and region level and that only one person per region provide updates to headquarters.

- A new update form will be presented at the region meeting for discussion
- We hope to have better control over this information with our future website design.
- · Please continue to send Sun Region Website changes to Lynn Abbey.

Headquarters – Currently, EGA headquarters is an "office", not a destination.

- Our 4 staff members are settled into our new office space where we will remain for several years.
- We will compensate for the lack of gallery space by posting more pictures of the collection on our website and exhibiting in galleries throughout the US.
- In hindsight, the collection and library were accessible to only a few members who visited the Louisville location. We need to find creative ways to expose many more members to these wonderful resources.

- The combined cost of our office, storage facility and utilities is approximately 1/5 of what we paid in our previous location.
- This change will impact our goal of reaching financial stability and a balanced budget in a very positive way.
- We are actively looking for a small, daily accessible location to store our collection (currently in the home
 of a RD who lives in Louisville) where our curator can work with the collection and National Exhibit pieces
 to prepare them for travel.

If asked about our previous location, I would suggest that the following explanation be given: The owner broke the lease by failing to maintain the building. We evacuated the building and established a new office at 1355 Bardstown Rd., Suite 157, Louisville, KY 40204. A possibility exists that the owner might attempt to sue us sometime between now and 2013 when our lease is up. There is no way of predicting if or when he might take this action. We have moved on and we need to encourage our members to participate in the good work that we do, enjoy their needlework and move on with us! One of my favorite sayings is "I will not give reality to trouble that may never come."

Marketing - "Sadly, EGA is a well-kept secret"

- Effective marketing is an important element of every effort that we make to grow our organization. We need to promote, promote sometimes we don't see immediate results, but eventually our efforts will pay off with new members.
- · Here are a few of the upcoming projects our EGA marketing committee is working on are:
 - A) EGA will ask us to complete an electronic survey in July. The information is needed to obtain specific information that is required for successful grant requests as well as how to sell advertising for NeedleArts.
 - B) We will soon have access to a new brochure (that can be downloaded from our website) that our chapters can customize to fit their local needs.
 - C) EGA will compile a list of needlework, framing, quilting, beading shops to put on website that provide discounts for EGA members. If you have suggestions, please e-mail them to me.

More to come!

Education

- Our new Education director is actively working on changes that will improve the quality and accessibility of EGA educational opportunities. Some new programs are:
 - § In the near future, Petite Projects will be added to the "members" section of the website.

 This is an important step in a new "Path of Education" program that helps members transition from Petite Projects all the way through the Master Craftsman program. We are looking for new Petite Projects (all techniques).
 - We will include webinars or "You-Tube videos" about stitching techniques and solutions that will be
 open to the public a great way to promote our organization

Membership (The following information will also be sent to each Sun Region membership chair.)

- Chapter lists were sent out by Tonya Parks to each chapter to verify with chapter records.
- Technically everyone's dues can be paid starting April 1 and will late after May 31. Please send payment and forms as early as possible.
- New member form and payment needs to be sent to Tonya as soon as possible after a member joins.

 Part of our customer service improvement drive is for Tonya to mail the card and new member information within one week of receiving the paperwork and dues.

Financials

- In April 2009, we replaced our previous office manager with Gina Elliott. The transition was a difficult one
 resulting in delays in providing important 2008 information to the IRS and auditors.
- Gina was up to the task but there were many obstacles to overcome including the problems with the old building, working from home, and the move to our new location.
- End of year financials for 2009 were being worked on at the same time as receiving the chapter financial reports.
- Here is the status of our 2009 year-end chapter financial reports:
 - The forms that were supposed to have been mailed out did not reach all treasurers.
 - Completed forms that were appropriately filed electronically were not forwarded properly via the website.

EGA Treasurer Kathy Singleton and region directors are working with Gina to get it all straightened out. (Jenna's personal note: I will verify the status of each chapter and personally communicate with each one that has not been accounted for.)

Bylaws Carol Tsoukalas

Recommendation from bylaws committee to be voted on March 27, 2010

Please review the following recommendation for vote at the region Board of Director's meeting on Saturday March 27.

Recommendation: I, Carol Tsoukalas, bylaws chair, recommend that the Sun Region board amend its standing policies and procedures and its bylaws as follows. (Text to be changed has been struck through and new text has been underlined.)

Bylaws Article V Section 1 on page III-C-3in Rep's Notebook

The region shall hold three (3) two (2) meetings per year unless otherwise ordered by the board of directors.

Policies page III-D-1 in Rep's Notebook

The region shall hold three (3) two (2) meetings per year unless otherwise ordered by the board of directors. The meetings shall be the annual meeting, a meeting in conjunction with the region seminar (if a seminar is held), and one or more additional meetings per year. Written notice of all region board of directors meetings shall be given to the member chapters at least thirty (30) days prior to such meetings.

Rationale: Only two meetings per year are held in actual practice.

I hope all of the chapters are finding time to take advantage of our region-sponsored Group Correspondence Course. This is such a good deal! But the procedures were very confusing and cumbersome, so we've decided to revise them. Here are the basics:

Simplified Correspondence Course Procedures

There are just a few steps to starting your Sun Region GCC

- 1. Select a GCC.
- 2. Sign up all interested members in your chapter.
- 3. If you have 10 but less than 20 + the coordinator, contact Cheri Hammer at sledgetoo2@cox.net and she will advertise your GCC by adding it to the list on the website and sending an e-mail to each chapter.
- 4. After 2 months you may proceed with the registration process.
 - a) Mail "EGA Registration/Information Request Form" to Brad Cape at Headquarters (see P 33 in the 2009-2010 Education Catalog)
 - b) After receiving the registration and participant list forms from Brad, complete and mail to Pam Burke so that she can send the check to EGA.
 - c) Send a copy of the form in b. with a chapter check for the total amount for the texts to the teacher.
- 5. If you have less than 10 participants, consider working with another chapter. You may advertise your group for an unlimited amount of time but will need to reach the minimum 10 for the region to pay.

BERMUDA - Our newest chapter has manned a booth at the Lifestyle Expo in Bermuda to introduce themselves to the community and the many opportunities that are available to EGA members in the art of needlework.

BISCAYNE - Members have completed 55 samplers for Habitat for Humanity Dade County area. 135 Kissing pillow tops for our troops, and 6 members stitched Heart pictures for the Ronald McDonald House in Orlando. They collected "pop" tops for Ronald McDonald House and used stamps for the Catholic Orphanage. Collecting personal toiletries for the Abused Spouses Center and penny coins for the Community Habilitation Center for the Mentally Challenged Adults. A new project this year was 110 crocheted or knitted Caps for children at the Miami Children's Hospital and the Neonatal Care Unit at North Shore Medical Center. Members donated a total of \$150 and collected food items for the needy for Riviera Presbyterian Church. 25 Bookmarks were made for the National Book week.

CANOPY OAKS - Several of their members have made baby quilts for a local Neonatal Center. They had a Needle Arts display at the Leon County Library, NE branch

CENTRAL FLORIDA - Making Samplers for Habitat for Humanity, knitting baby caps, blankets and booties for the Neonatal unit at the Winnie Palmer Hospital. Collecting books, quilts and toiletries for the Beta House for new young mothers. They are also stitching Kissing Pillows for the service men and had a display of Needle Art at the Central Florida Fair. New project this year has been making Heart Designs for a wall at the Ronald McDonald House. 13 Hearths have been finished so far.

CHAIN STITCHERS - Made Habitat Samplers for Lake and Sumter Counties. For the last five years this chapter has decorated a Christmas Tree and donated the proceeds to the women of Cornerstone Hospice of Lake and Sumter Counties. This year \$1228 was presented to this very grateful organization. Many of the members knit and crochet baby items such as hats, mittens, booties and Afghans for the Leesburg Regional Medical Center. A donation of \$100 Publix gift card and food was donated to the Saint Philip Lutheran Church

DuCLAY - Contributes gifts for teenagers to the Quigley House, which is a women's shelter in Clay County, Florida. Collected and sent needlework supplies to our friends in Australia.

GULFVIEW - Collect supplies for classroom use for the Pasco County Creation Station. They also make and donate blankets for Project Linus, for seriously ill and traumatized children age 0 to 18. Ditty bags are filled with personal items and donated to a local children's shelter in Lutz, FL. and Habitat for Humanity Samplers are made for homes in West Pasco County. They sent needlework supplies to our Australia friends. Gulfview continues to contribute kissing pillow tops and donations to the Yellow Rose chapter in Texas for finishing and distribution. Our 12 week youth program for homeschooled children "Stitching With the Guild" will continue with another session in the fall of 2010.

INDIAN RIVER - Collects needlework supplies, extra fabric, floss and makes up kits to be donated to servicemen, women and families at the Haley VA Hospital in Tampa, FL., Brooke Army hospital and Walter Reed. A EGA Indian River Chapter business card is enclosed in each kit as a way to reach out to others who may not know anything about EGA. This chapter is also making Samplers for Habitat for Humanity. Pop-tops are collected and sent to Ronald MacDonald House in Orlando, FL. Used stamps are collected and sent to Biscayne Chapter. Over 1000 Toiletries were donated to the homeless. This chapter also has an active program teaching young people beginning embroidery at the local library. They have also send needlework supplies to our friends in Australia. A total of 105 Kissing pillows were given to the family readiness center at Patrick Air Force Base and 13 were sent to California for The Rock of the Marne Battalion.

NEAPOLITAN - Have been stitching samplers for Habitat for Humanity of Collier County, FL. They sent needlework supplies to our friends in Australia.

SAND DOLLAR - Delivered 3 lap robes, 12 knitted shrugs with sleeves, 3 Walker bags sewn with Velcro, 3 Shawls and 6 pair of bed slippers to local nursing homes in New Smyrna and Port Orange, FL. 24 Knitted baby sets were made for preemie babies. 5 Samplers were made for Habitat for Humanity Homes in Volusia County, FL. 94 Christmas ornaments were made to decorate the tree at the Atlantic School for special need children. Needle works supplies were collected and sent to our Australia friends. At our Christmas luncheon \$200 was collected for the Westminister Church where we meet, \$110 for Gifts of Love along with canned foods, and \$100 and pet food for the South Volusia Humane Society.

SAND DUNES - Stitch Habitat for Humanity Samplers. Stitch bookmarks for their local Library as an incentive for the children's reading program. A new outreach project is "Quilts for Kids" personalized for terminally ill children. They also stitched in a local bookstore to exposure people to the art of needlework.

SANDHILL CRANE - Stitches Habitat Samplers for the new homes in Hernando County and sending stitched "Kissing Pillows" squares to the Yellow Rose Chapter of Texas. They also collect clothing and personal items to give to Mid-Florida Community Services for senior citizens. They collected and sent needlework supplies to our friends in Australia. They have started a new youth program teaching youth and their Mom's needlework.

SARASOTA - Make hats, blankets and robes for the Neonatal center and collect items for Bethesda House. They are working on a sampler for the 'Spanish Point", the home of wealthy women who helped settle Sarasota. They collected needlework supplies to be sent to our friends in Australia.

SEA GRAPE - More than 931 baby caps have been made and donated to Gulfcoast Hospital. They have a program to teach youth needlework. Collected tabs, lids and pennies for the Ronald McDonald House. They also stitch bookmarks for literacy, and collected and sent needlework supplies for our friends in Australia. At Christmas time food was donated to the Harlem Heights food pantry in South Ft. Myers.

STITCHING GATORS - Have been active with projects for Breast Cancer. Collect stamps, magnets phone books and labels for recycling for Sidney Lanier School for limited children. They taught children needlework in a summer program.

SUNCOAST - Continues making lap robes for nursing homes, kissing pillows for our military and blankets for the patients at the Susan Cheek Needler Breast Center.


