GCC - Nuts & Bolts

There are just a few steps to starting your Sun Region GCC

- 1. Select a GCC.
- 2. Sign up all interested members in your chapter.
- 3. If you have 10 but less than 20 + the coordinator, contact Cheri Hammer at sledgetoo2@cox.net and she will advertise your GCC by adding it to the list on the website and sending an e-mail to each chapter.
- 4. After 2 months you may proceed with the registration process.
 - a. Mail "EGA Registration/Information Request Form" to Brad Cape at Headquarters (see P 33 in the 2009-2010 Education Catalog)
 - b. After receiving the registration and participant list forms from Brad, complete and mail to Pam Burke so that she can send the check to EGA.
 - c. Send a copy of the form in b., with a chapter check for the total amount for the texts to the teacher.
- 5. If you have less than 10 participants, consider working with another chapter. You may advertise your group for an unlimited amount of time but will need to reach the minimum 10 for the region to pay your fee.

Please allow 6 weeks for paperwork to be processed. Then enjoy your class!!!!


From the Region's Webmaster (Lynn Abbey):

We're making progress on the Sun Region website.

We've added a blog! Sun Region Threads (http://www.sunregionega.org/SunRegionThreads/) is designed to be a virtual meeting place not only for updates about region-based activities, but also for conversations about embroidery itself. Because, while it's important to know when a particular form has been revised, it's also important to share our excitement about embroidery itself. We will be demonstrating how the blog works at the September Region Meeting at the Sawgrass Marriott.

Earlier this summer I sent an email to each chapter's region representative to advise me about creating their chapters' spaces on the website. Four chapters have gotten back to me: Indian River, Central Florida, Neapolitan, and Chain Stitchers. Both Chain Stitchers and Indian River said that their chapters were already maintaining websites and asked only that I create a link from the region website to their chapters' sites. The Neapolitan chapter asked me to incorporate their chapter's information directly into the region website. I hope that by the time we get to the Sawgrass Resort at the end of September, I will have been able to integrate several more chapters into the website and that we can start adventuring beyond the basics.



Christine Kampmeyer just attended the 245th Habitat dedication. Our members are encouraged to keep on stitching the samplers so our supply doesn't run out. We are still stitching "kissing pillows" for Patrick Air Force Base. We also continue to collect postage stamps, pop tabs, and labels for education.

We do manage to stitch and have fun. In July, we celebrated "Christmas in July" by collecting items for a local children's haven and then we had fun making an adorable roly poly Santa Christmas ornament. We had our annual August book sale on Aug. 16th. In September, Thea Rusch, Collections Director from the Ruth Funk Center for Textile Arts in Melbourne, will be speaking to us about the new exhibit: "Textiles of Latin America". In October, Annette Clark will teach our chapter the Comanche Stitch in beading.
