Ladies, I, Karan Quintero, am the new Historian for our great Sun Region. A little history....I have been serving on the local and region level since shortly after I joined in 1987 at the Biscayne Chapter here in Miami, but funny part is I have NEVER held a Historian position so this is new ground for me. Jan has some great ideas for my role here which I will try hard to bring to fruition. <u>Historic Tidbit</u>: In the early part of 1977, Mr. Jon Ferguson, President of LeMoyne Chapter EGA, began the arduous task of gathering information regarding how to organize a seminar. With much correspondence from National and other national region chapters with experience in seminar organization and management, the deed was done! <u>The first Sun Region Seminar was held May 21-25, 1979, in the Orlando area.</u> Sun Region was composed of eight chapters at that time, with Central Florida Chapter hosting our maiden seminar. Martha Ellis, Faculty Coordinator, and her committee had a list of 87 national teachers inviting proposals of classes. Hotel costs were \$25/daily single occupancy, \$30/daily double occupancy and \$60/daily one bedroom suite. Correspondence reflects concern of slow registration sign-ups and suggesting members could reduce the costs by having four members to a room. No additional information regarding this seminar is in our archives. Any additional information will be gladly accepted

Many concerns remain the same after 33 years. What does not change is that once an embroiderer/beader/ needleartist, always an embroiderer/beader/needleartist. <u>We love what we are!!</u> Any excuse affords us opportunity to do something old, something new or something challenging.

#### <u>OUTREACH</u> JoyceAnne Stevens, chair

Based on reports I have received, 7 chapters stitched in public in the past few months. Canopy Oaks stitched at the public library in Tallahassee on the day their month long exhibit opened. DuClay and Gulfview also stitched at libraries. Sand Dollar stitched at Hobby Lobby and Sand Dunes stitched at Books-a-Million. Biscayne stitched at the Dade County Fair the latter part of March and will be stitching at the Fairchild Tropical Botanic Gardens, Coral Gables Nov 9-11. Neapolitan stitched twice in February in the garden of Palm Cottage, an historic house in Naples. Later in Feb Neapolitan members stitched during their bi-annual needlework exhibit.

The comments from all were similar. Some locations had more visitors than others. Having the event in a local paper seemed to help bring people out to see the stitching and visitors showed interest in the stitching but almost no interest in actually stitching or joining EGA.

To paraphrase what one person wrote in her report: Stitching in public is fun. It provides an opportunity to show what we do. It is also an informal opportunity to answer needlework questions, show various types of needlework, explain stitches, and give information about EGA.

If your chapter stitched in public and you have ideas to add please send them to me and I will continue to compile the information.

Something to think about. A few days ago a fellow EGA member and I were discussing how we became aware of EGA. She said she was interested in learning to stitch and discovered there was an EGA chapter in the city where she was living. It happened that the EGA chapter was having an exhibit so my friend went to see it and was so overwhelmed by the beautiful pieces and what appeared to be very difficult work that she decided she wouldn't fit in and gave up the idea of EGA until a number of years later and a move to a different city. It made us both wonder if perhaps our exhibits and our stitching demos should include some elementary pieces with larger count fabric. As I said, something to consider.

#### <u>THINKING OUTSIDE THE ORT BOX</u>

At each Sun Region meeting, the hostess chapter traditionally prepares a needle arts program for attendees. Many past programs have included a short stitching project, often with already-prepared kits, that can usually be stitched in the one sitting. It is always a delight to stitch something new. You might say that attendees accumulate enough snipped threads to fill an Ort Box.

The Saturday evening program on April 14, 2012 was, however, a different and invigorating experience. Sun Region member Linda M. Dean, a recent recipient of EGA's Master Craftsman in Crewel Embroidery, presented a lecture entitled "17<sup>th</sup> Century Crewel Embroidery". While attendees stitched on their own needlework projects, Linda told about her research on the topic and the era. Did you know that what we call crewel wool thread today was first mass produced in the early 1600s? Some people consider crewel wool thread to be a 17<sup>th</sup> century invention. Linda also showed several of her stitched pieces that were submitted as part of the Master Craftsman; although, her Step 6 of 6, the "masterpiece" was not available at this program because it is currently on



exhibit in Washington DC at the national headquarters of National Society Colonial Dames Seventeenth Century.

What a fun experience we had in both learning about historical aspects of crewel embroidery and hearing how Linda worked through the Master Craftsman program, even after getting an "no-pass" on her first submission. We all continued to be engaged until we ran out of questions. Special congratulations go to Linda for her hard work and accomplishment and thanks for graciously sharing.

#### BISCAYNE Marge Holmes

At the April meeting the ladies worked on the bookmarks to meet our goal this year. On May 23 we had our annual Stash to Stash sale and we began our Saturday stitch-ins at the church once a month. We have three GCCs (the registration paid for by the chapter as a gift to members) going at this time and the different groups are meeting separately at members' homes and then together at the Saturday stitch in at the church.

The outreach group has been busy so far this year, with 34 Habitat Samplers dedicated and given to the new homeowners, 44 embroidered hearts for the Soldier Family Kissing pillows sent off to various places, 50 cozy caps for the pediatric oncology patients and 90 embroidered bookmarks for reading accomplishments in four different schools. We delivered 15 pounds of pop-tops to Ronald McDonald House, 25 pounds of toiletries to Safe Space Shelter, Pennies to the Community Habilitation Center and coupons for education to Faith Fellowship Elementary School in Homestead.

One set of kissing pillows was done on a very personal basis. My grandson, Marine LCPL Steven A. Holmes, Jr. was home on leave in March prior to his deployment overseas and I stitched, personalized with his name and finished with much love and he posed (in good humor) with his mother and kissed his pillow and gave it to his Mom and she did the same, while the proud grandmother beamed. I had stitched 73 pillows while my shoulder healed and these two rounded it out to 75.

The June meeting is the last formal meeting until September, but we will continue to have the stitch-ins at the church at least once a month to stay in touch with each other. In September we will present the slate of officers for the election which will take place in November. Our program in September is a sweet bag (Petite Project), October is a Hardanger ornament and in November Judith Richardson will travel to Miami to teach a beaded bracelet.

Biscayne had seven members at the Celebration Stitch-In and everyone seemed to really enjoy themselves, especially the old timers who socialized with their friends from chapters throughout the state. That part is really half the fun of going to these events. We enjoyed catching up with them and their projects both on-going and planned. On behalf of Biscayne members, my compliments to everyone who worked so hard to make this a great success.

Afterward, we shared a delicious lunch of home-made salads and desserts.

Summertime for Canopy Oaks this year will be a series of "sit-n-stitch" for June, July and August. Our New England Blue Crewel project will be rescheduled and held during the season.
