I'm looking forward to seeing all of you at the Plantation on Crystal River, 9301 West Fort Island Trail, Crystal River, Florida 34429, for the October 26-27 meeting. A calm relaxing site. Manatees, live oak trees with hanging moss, a pretty gazebo to sit in and a great place to go on a pontoon boat to see a sunset. Ahhhhh! Crystal River is located off of Kings Bay and is one of the largest aquifers in the state and home of more than 400 West Indian manatees. Manatee tours, golf and fishing are available if you wish to bring along a spouse. Pontoon boats are available for rent.

The room rate is \$109.00 or \$129.00 plus 9% tax; the \$129.00 rate is for a patio room. Call the Plantation at 800-632-6262 to make your reservation on or before September 26. Room block is for Embroiderers Guild of America Board Meeting. If you decide to extend your stay, this rate is available three days prior and following the dates of this meeting. We have complimentary Internet in the guest and meeting room. Also 20% off the AVEDA Spa menu. You must book appointment 30 days in advance. From Tampa it is approximately 75 miles. FL - 589 Toll North to US 98, West on US 98 to US / SR 55, North on SR 55 to Crystal River, left on Ft. Island Trail. Inn is on the right.

From Jacksonville I-10 west to US 301, exit South to SR 24, SR 24 to US 121, Southwest on US 121 to US 19, South on US 19 to SR 44 intersection in Crystal River. Continue US 19 south to 2nd traffic light, right onto West Ft. Island Trail. Inn is on the right.

From Orlando area FL Turnpike north to I-75, I-75 North to Exit 329 Wildwood, West on SR 44 to Crystal River, South on US 19 to 2nd traffic light, right onto West Ft. Island Trail. Inn is on the right.

From the south I-75 North to exit 301 toward Brooksville/Weeki Wachi left onto US 98/SR 50 Cortex, left onto E Jefferson St. Follow E Jefferson US98-SR700, turn right onto Ponce de Leon US98-SR70, right onto Suncoast Blvd US98-US19, left on Ft Island Trail. Inn is on the right.

After the successful 1982 Mini-Seminar there seems to have been a lively correspondence with several hotels. Reservations had to be made individually at the Countryside Motel (\$24+ tax double room), the Comfort Motel (\$20+ tax double room or the Days Inn (\$32.88+ tax double room). The final location chosen, the North Dunedin Baptist Church, on May 16-17, 1983.

Registration was \$30 which included class fee, lunch and dinner (Chef Charley's) on Monday with kits not exceeding \$20.00. All registration forms, listing three choices, had to be post-marked by April 1, with an enclosed self-addressed envelope. Registration opened at 8:30am requiring the kit fee monies ready for payment. Monday classes 9-4pm with a lunch break and Tuesday Classes 8:30-11:30am.

Twelve classes were offered:

- 1. Tray Cloth in Drawn Thread Work With Hemstitching by Ritva Bowman-\$9,
- 2. Star and Flowers by LeE Brady-\$20,
- 3. Silk and Metal Surface by Martha Ellis-\$18
- 4. Angel In Silver Metallic Threads by Rena Gordan-\$6,
- 5 Beginning Hardanger Embroidery by Jonalene T. Gutwein-\$12
- 6. Medieval Ladies by Marcia E. Hardin-\$11

There were 136 participants lead by ten teachers. By the end of the second day many of the classes showed a great deal of progress on their individual projects. The Gulfview and Sun Coast Chapters had provided two breakfasts of coffee and donuts and a nice salad lunch. Surprise entertainment at Chef Charles was a skit on Pantomine written by Reader and Martha Ellis, performed by Leona Brady and Martha Pearly Vogt. Who knew we had such creative writers and performers to compete with those Hollywood types of the time!!

#### Outreach

#### JoyceAnne Stevens & Melody Bryant

Summer is a relaxed quiet time of stitching for Sun Region members but Outreach continues. Biscayne Chapter completed and mailed 33 Patriotic Hearts, completed and presented 11 samplers to new homeowners thru Habitat for Humanity(Sept) and distributed 50 knitted and crocheted caps for children undergoing chemotherapy treatment. During August, duClay Chapter displayed needlework in the display cases and in September will be showing larger pieces in the gallery of the Orange Park Library. Indian River Chapter also had a library exhibit at Satellite Beach Library. They collected and sent boxes of embroidery supplies to 2 military hospitals and so far this year have stitched 6 samplers for Habitat for Humanity. They conducted a very successful Teaching Children program this summer working with 8 children over 3 sessions. Their Toiletries for Homeless program is closing in on their goal of 2000 items. As of July 15 they had reach 59% of the goal. Also in July they hosted a speaker from "The Haven", an organization that provides safe homes for children and presented items for use at The Haven as well as monetary donations.

Sand Dollar Chapter has also been busy stitching for others. They completed 40 ornaments for the Life Skills program at Atlantic High School, 3 shrugs and 10 walker pockets for various nursing homes, 3 samplers for Habitat for Humanity and 22 baby blankets, 13 baby sets (hats and booties) for drug dependent mothers at the Stewart Matchum.

Sand Dunes Chapter presented a sampler for a new Habitat for Humanity house and in August will be collecting the blankets they have been working on this year to be given to the Children in Crisis Center.

Sandhill Crane Chapter is another chapter stitching samplers for Habitat for Humanity and works with 2 counties. In September they will their present 79<sup>th</sup> sampler since 2003. Sandhill Crane Chapter has also been working with the Rotary Club and donated supplies for "Dresses Without Borders" for Haiti and continues to support Mid Florida Community Services with donations that go mainly for Senior Citizens.

Sea Grape Chapter has been making baby caps and Chemo caps. In July 39 caps were delivered to Gulf Coast Hospital and so far this year Sea Grape has given 427 baby caps and 35 chemo caps for a total of 1,430 volunteer hours.


